FIRE SAFETY

CHECKLIST

- Make sure your room has working smoke detectors
 Know two ways to safely get out of your room and building
- Clean the dryer lint trap before AND after every use
- Ensure all candles are flameless candles. NOTE: You cannot have real candles in your residence hall
- Know and practice a fire escape plan
- Extension cords or multiple plug adapters/power strips in the residence halls must be surge-protected
- Ensure no cords are stapled to the walls or run under rugs. Keep cords out of high-traffic areas of your room
- ☐ Talk with your Resident Assistant (RA) and roommates to determine the safest place to meet outside in the event of a fire or fire evacuation
- Keep your room, exits, hallways, and stairs clear.
 In the event of a fire, you'll need to leave quickly!
- Leave quickly and do not spend time gathering all of your items when you hear a fire or smoke alarm in the building
- Keep watch for fire hazards report fire hazards to your residence hall staff
- Encourage those around you to practice fire safety in the residence halls








RESIDENCE DISASTER PREPAREDNESS

CHECKLIST



- Have a disaster supply kit that contains multiple days worth of non-perishable food and water, important personal documents, medications, a first aid kit, and anything else you may need in a disaster
- ☐ Know the location of storm shelters in every building you visit Ask your RA where to shelter in your hall
- Keep a stocked first aid kit in your room
- Attend preparedness trainings hosted by UNT Emergency Management
- ☐ Have multiple means of recieving emergency information
 - Eagle Alert
 - City of Denton CodeRED
 - Denton County Alerts
 - NOAA Weather Radio

☐ When you hear the City of Denton outdoor warning sirens, go indoors and seek more information (KNTU 88.1 or the local news). NOTE: Sirens are tested on the first Wednesday of the month. If there is inclement weather, the test is postponed until the following Wednesday
